

Letter From Archdeacon Mary

There's an infectious sense of new beginnings at the start of September, even if we don't have children or grandchildren of school age, most of us can remember the thrill and anticipation of a new academic year or starting at a new school. The shops in town are stocked with



clothes and accessories for learning and we know that a change in the pace of life is coming as the school holidays draw to a close for many.

Our family has already had the privilege of a new start in this parish since we moved in a few months ago. We're so grateful to everyone from the town who has given us such a great welcome. Lots of things are new to us here and we're enjoying learning fresh things each day.

Living close to the Jewish retreat centre on Church Walks means that we're daily amongst people who have the courage and distinctiveness to wear special clothing as a sign of their faith. It may sometimes be controversial, but I think it's wonderful to see people wearing signs of their devotion. Just as school children wear the uniform of their school, so our Jewish neighbours (just like our Sikh and Muslim friends) remind us of the value of communicating loyalty to a relationship with God through outward signs of faith.

At the beginning of a new school year, there's an opportunity for all of us to make a new start in some way and witness to our commitment. Of course, growing in faith takes practice and often

involves failure. Sometimes we need to completely change the way that we think or behave: I remember as a child struggling with maths and wanting new equipment every September. There were expensive maths sets you could buy in tins with a ruler, a protractor, setsquares and a compass. I used to think that if only I had these then somehow maths would be easier! It took years for me to learn that it was more important to work to understand the subject than to have the coolest accessories (and I'm not sure I ever really understood what a set-square was for.)

This summer our church community has already embraced new things. In addition to many great activities, one particular joy of the past month has been the daily pilgrim prayer at St Tudno's. Thanks to a whole variety of people who volunteered to lead this there's been a regular fresh heartbeat of prayer that has engaged many and been a wonderful source of hope and encouragement. The practice of prayer is a great place to start if we are keen to renew our faith. Edith Stein – the German Jewish philosopher who converted to Christianity and who died in Auschwitz – spoke about this, recognising the wisdom of being gentle with ourselves as we try to learn new things. She recommended that each day"...when night comes, and you look back over the day and see how fragmentary everything has been and how much you planned that has gone undone and all the reasons you have to be embarrassed and ashamed just take everything exactly as it is, put it in God's hands and trust it to Him."

I look forward to continuing the learning journey in your company.

Welcome Martin

The appointment of The Rev'd Martin Pritchard as our assistant curate commenced on 23rd July. Martin trained for the diocese at St. Mellitus' College achieving a Durham-accredited degree and began ordained ministry in the Bro Deiniol Ministry Area in 2016. As I write, we are now halfway through


our August Lunch-time Organ Concerts and a full report on these will appear in next month's Parish Magazine.

Pilgrim Prayers

The Pilgrim Prayers held at St. Tudno's at noon every day in August except Sundays has been extended. The Prayers will now also be said throughout the month of September.

Junior Church (Sunday School)

Junior Church will recommence on Sunday 9 September. The time has been changed to 9.30 am and the venue will be the Memorial Chapel.

St. Tudno's Church

It was a warm morning with a light breeze on Sunday 15 June. Revd Robert Pearce led the service and Daphne Balchin played the keyboard for the congregation of 15. Hymns included "Be still for the presence of the Lord" and "Shine, Jesus shine". The theme of the address was prophets being whistleblowers in relation to the importance of listening to God.

On Sunday 22 July it was a cooler morning and quite breezy. Revd David Jenkins led the service and Terry Hemuss played the keyboard. The theme of the readings and address was Mary Magdalene, her love for Christ, Christ's love and the resurrection. The poem by Mary E Frye "Do not stand at my grave and weep" was read, and hymns included "Here is love, vast as the ocean" and "Peace, perfect peace".

There were 14 stalwarts at the service on Sunday 29 July. It was a very wet morning and Marine Drive was closed due to rock falls. Revd Robert Pearce led the service and Daphne Balchin played the keyboard. Hymns included "For the saints who brought glad tidings" and "Lord of beauty, thine the splendour". The theme of the readings and address was the feeding of the five thousand, sharing with others and becoming aware of the small miracles in our own lives.

On Sunday 5 August it was hot and sunny. Revd Mike Harrison led the service and Revd Robert Pearce played the keyboard for a congregation of 29. The theme was a continuation of the feeding of the five thousand, with Jesus the bread of life and what that means to our faith as individuals, while hymns included "At the Lamb's high feast we sing" and "Alleluia, sing to Jesus". A shortened Eucharist in the church followed the open-air service.

Revd David Jenkins led the service on the wet Sunday morning of 12 August. Daphne Balchin played the keyboard for a congregation of 26. Hymns included "Seek ye first the kingdom of God" and "Give me joy in my heart". The theme of the address was Jesus being the bread of life, our nourishment and sustenance. We were delighted to be brought the Green Flag Award plaque by Marie and to hear the news of Holy Trinity's success in Llandudno in Bloom (see the article on page 17 for more information).

Compline by candlelight on the evening of Tuesday 14 August was led by Revd Martin Pritchard. The service was attended by 11 people and with the extra seating in the chancel for Pilgrim Prayers we were all able to sit together there.

At the time of writing we were about two thirds of the way through the month of Pilgrim Prayers, which have been a valuable addition to St. Tudno's ministry. These Celtic prayers for the 21st century were said at midday every Monday to Saturday and 16 people were involved in leading the prayers in pairs on different days. On most days others joined the prayers: members of the parish, locals and visitors, some of whom came specially, others who happened to be there at the right time and everyone appreciated the opportunity to make a personal pilgrimage. The Prayers have been so beneficial to all attending that it has been agreed to continue this ministry throughout September.

Harvest Thanksgiving at St. Tudno's will be on Sunday 30 September at 4.00 pm. Please note the change of date, due to restricted access to the Great Orme during the Wales Rally GB. The service will include a collection of tins and packets of food for Conwy Food Bank and will be followed by tea and cakes.

The church is open every day and openair services continue at 11.00 am every Sunday in September, with the free taxi departing from HolyTrinity at 10.30 am. On Sunday 2 September the open-air service will be followed by a shortened Eucharist in the church. Compline by candlelight will be at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 4 September (please note change of date). On Sunday 23 September we look forward to welcoming the Llandudno Branch of Soroptimists International for a service for the International Day of Peace at 3.00 pm.

We look forward to seeing you at St. Tudno's.

pleasure to talk to the people who visit St. Tudno's, to learn what has brought them to the church and to invite them to return. During the day Terry, with some assistance from Iris, began cutting back grass which had grown over a number of flat gravestones in the area of the benches. Some were recovered which must have been lost to view for many years and it is hoped to gradually continue this project. During the day we also picked up from Llandudno a folding ramp which will now provide wheelchair access to the chancel in St. Tudno's.

The Friends' annual guided walk on the Great Orme was held on the evening of Wednesday 15 August – which was very wet! The theme was industrial archaeology of the Great Orme and the walk was led by Nick Challinor of the Great Orme Exploration Society. Eight hardy souls in waterproofs joined Nick for the walk and as we started from St. Tudno's Nick gave us an introduction in the church before we ventured out.We walked out to Bryniau Poethion, the area of surface and shallow Victorian copper workings and looked over the Bronze Age copper mines. Continuing a little further we studied the Brammock Rod reconstructions which demonstrate one of the methods used for draining the Victorian copper mines, before returning to the church for tea, coffee and homemade biscuits.

On Saturday I September the Friends will be holding a coffee morning in Holy Trinity church hall at 10.00 am and we hope to see some of you then.We look forward to welcoming the Flintshire Historical Society who will be visiting St. Tudno's on Saturday 15 September and Ysgol San Sior Year 5, who will be visiting later in the month.

Perhaps the most interesting were the different interpretations of the same original building frame. It is amazing

were sweet shops, a jewellery shop, a house decorated for Christmas, rustic cottages, a beach scene including beach huts, various interpretations of a rest home – the list is endless.

It is amazing the amount of work that goes into producing these wonderful miniatures. Although many miniature items can be bought, a great deal of pleasure is obtained by those who build everything from scratch. Although to a layperson, the pleasure of appreciating doll's houses sounds like a very feminine activity, this is certainly not so. It is perhaps the skill of making miniature models, sometimes working miniature models, that many men find a challenge.

Awful Traffic Congestion...

...but far worse than jams of road vehicles: the desperate and illegal trafficking of human slaves (touched on in my sermon at Holy Trinity on 12 August). Please remember that this vile and fast-growing trade involves some 46 million people worldwide, of whom 13,000 are estimated currently to be in the UK – and there may well be some victims and perpetrators here in Llandudno. Nail bars and car washes can sometimes be the sites of this abuse.

Spotting the signs

How do you know if someone in your community is a victim of human trafficking? The Clewer Institute suggests::

Appearance

- Shows signs of physical or psychological abuse and untreated injuries.
- Looks malnourished, unkempt, withdrawn or neglected.
- Seems under the control or influence of others.
- Wears the same clothes every day.
- Where there is no safety equipment.

Accommodation

- Lives in dirty, cramped what overcrowded accommodation
- Lives and works at the same address.
- Unfamiliar with their neighbourhood or where they work.

Travel

- Rarely allowed to travel on their own.
- Collected and dropped off regularly early in the morning or late at night.
- In a crowded minibus with other workers.
- Has no control of their identification documents or passport.

Seeking help

- Reluctant to seek help and avoids eye contact.
- Appears frightened or hesitant to talk to strangers.
- Fears police, and doesn't know who to trust or where to get help.
- Afraid of deportation, and risk of violence to them or their family.

Remembrance 100: Silence – a gift book for Remembrance


