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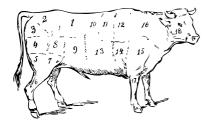



### Letter From the Vicar

In The Royal wedding this year, Bishop Michael Curry of the Episcopal Church of America sounded the right note in his words to the Royals on God's love. Afterwards people were talking about the sermon as much as about Meghan Markle's dress! He quoted form the French

Jesuit Priest, mystic, and palaeontologist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (1881-1955):

"The day will come when, after harnessing space, winds, the tide and gravitation, we shall harness for God the energies of love. And, on that day, for the second time in the history of the world [humanity] will have discovered fire.



"God created this evolving universe because God is Love and each of us is God's gift to the world. Our life purpose is to make a difference in transforming that world...."

For Teilhard, "love is the most universal, the most tremendous and the most mysteri-

ous of the cosmic forces." Love is both human and divine. Divine love is the energy that brought the universe into being and binds it together. Human love is whatever energy we use to help divine love achieve its purpose....

Love of God and love of one another lies at the core of every traditional religion. Love not only permeates those religions, it transcends them and binds them together. Divine love embraces everyone and everything. There is nothing outside the divine embrace.

From Teilhard's perspective, then, helping the human family move toward the next step of human evolution in love is the most urgent and challenging task of contemporary spirituality.

For Teilhard, love is the essential nature of God, and the best name for God (see I John 4:8). As Teilhard envisioned it, divine love is the self-expressive creative force that gave birth to our evolving universe. It is that same divine love that continuously keeps every atom of creation existing and moving forward on its grand evolutionary journey back to God.

It was for the love of all created beings that God the Father sent his Son into the world that we might learn of God's love for us and that he might show us how to live "The Way" of love.

I think it's time we talked more about God's love in Church and to the world God loves. Too many people have a view of God that doesn't set them free but is based on fear and an understanding of a God who thinks we have to be better or different than who if we are to be lovable by God. So I make no apology if I seem to be going on a bit about this in the pages of this magazine and in sermons. Christmas time of course is an especially important time to meditate upon the subject of Love Incarnate, of God being with us and amongst us in Jesus his son. Let's share the good news this Christmas by giving people we know a service postcard of the times of services in the Ministry Area over the festive season.

#### Peter La Trobe

The death of Peter La Trobe on 6 November saw the passing of one of the stalwarts of our Church family. Peter, his wife Wendy and his son Adrian began to attend St. George's Church in the mid-1980s. Peter was a giant of a man, towering over everyone. Wendy, on the other hand, was diminutive but whilst she lacked stature, she made up in other ways. Peter enjoyed a variety of jobs; on one occasion he completely baffled the inquisitors on TV's "What's My Line" when miming his occupation as a maker of handcuffs. He worked in Venue Cymru for some time after

his official retirement attending to the lighting and public address systems.

Peter and his family were very social, and the parishioners got to know them very well. They were enthusiastic in amateur dramatics and music and took part in many of the local musical productions. They were active members of St. George's Choir, driving in each Sunday from their home in Penmaenmawr. A couple of years after coming to the Parish, Peter and Wendy were involved in the Cursillo apostolic movement, introduced to the Parish by Ronald Keating, a former Rector; they became very active in the movement and worked extremely hard to keep it going. After the closure of St. Georges' Church, Peter and Wendy moved to Holy Trinity and joined the Trinity Church Choir; they also sung in the Trinity Players. In 2011, both were awarded the Archbishop of Wales' Certificate of Merit at Holy Trinity Church. Both sat on the PCC for some years and the Rector, John Nice, appointed Peter as his warden. Peter was also the PCC member responsible for health and safety; he represented the Parish at Youth to Christ and he organised the Men Who Sing concerts.

After Wendy's death, Peter moved to the Tan-y-Fron housing development in Llandudno; his contribution to the Parish remained undiminished. Peter will be very sadly missed by his Church Family. We extend to Adrian our deepest sympathy in his loss.


#### Remembrance in Llandudno

#### Faces of the Fallen

On the evenings of Friday 9 and Saturday 10 November the event "Faces of the Fallen" took place in Llandudno. Adrian Hughes of the Home Front Museum projected photographs from the grounds of St. John's Methodist Church on to the Wall of Marks and Spencer's, while collections were taken in aid of

the British Legion. Adrian had spent the last four years collecting photographs of the men of Llandudno and Penrhynside who had died in the First World War but where no photograph was available a silhouette of a soldier was shown. Each photograph or silhouette was accompanied with details of the man's name, rank, date of death and age – which ranged from 17 to 50 – and Nurse Aldwyth Williams was also included (see St. Tudno's article).

As the evening grew darker the photographs became clearer (each cycle of more than 200 photographs lasted about 30 minutes) and people stood quietly watching. Some had come to pay their respects to all who had died, others were looking out especially for

a family member but all were moved by the display.

#### Civic Service in Holy Trinity

There were over 500 present in Holy Trinity Church for this year's Civic Service on Remembrance Sunday which was also, Remembrance Day and the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice of the Great War in 1918.

The Service was led by the Vicar, the Rev Andrew Sully who was assisted by the Rev Neil Kirkham. The first hymn was "All People That on Earth Do Dwell" during which the standards of

the various ex-servicemen's and other organisations were brought to the altar. The lesson was read by the Mayor of Llandudno, Councillor David Hawkins, the intercessions were led by the Rev

Kirkham and the address was given by the Vicar. The other hymns were "Calon Lan", "By a Monument of Marble, or a Simple Wooden Cross", and "O God Our Help in Ages Past". The organ music before the service was JS Bach's Prelude and Fugue in E flat major 'St Anne'. The concluding music was Elgar's "Nimrod" from the Enigma Variations.

However, everyone there seemed happy enough to have taken part in the event and went off to warm up.At 7.05, to follow the beacon lighting, Holy Trinity bellringers began ringing the bells for 30 minutes as part of the national "Battle's Over, Ringing out for Peace" event.

#### St. Tudno's Church

On Sunday 28 October Holy Eucharist was celebrated at St. Tudno's for the first winter service of the season. This was led by Andrew, while Daphne Balchin played the keyboard. Hymns included "All my hope on God is founded" and "Thy hand, O God, has guided". The theme of the address was inclusiveness and the poem "In search of a roundtable" was read. Hot drinks and cakes were enjoyed after the service.

On Saturday 10 November the annual Boer War Remembrance service was held at St. Tudno's. The service was attended the by Mayor and Mayoress of Llandudno, members of Llandudno Lions Club and representatives of the Sea Cadets, Air Cadets and British Legion and wreaths were laid at the Boer War Memorial in the churchyard by the Mayor and the President of the Lions Club.

On Sunday 11 November we rang St. Tudno's bell at 12.30 pm as part of the national "Battle's Over, Ringing out for Peace" event (there was a choice of times at which bells could be rung). We were joined by another six people and read some appropriate poems and prayers.

Throughout November there was a First World War Commemoration display in St. Tudno's, featuring those buried or commemorated in St. Tudno's




Boer War Remembrance Service in St. Tudno's Churchyard.

churchyard. For each of the servicemen the display comprised his biography from Andy Leitch's Great War Project, a photograph where available and a photograph of his grave or memorial. We thank Adrian Hughes of the Home Front Museum for providing a number of the photographs. In addition to the servicemen, VAD Nurse Aldwyth Katrin Williams was included. Aldwyth had worked throughout the War in a Red Cross Hospital in Llandudno but died on 8 November 1918, in the influenza epidemic. One panel of the display showed illustrations of life during the war by artist, silhouettist and serving soldier Harry Lawrence Oakley. After the War Oakley spent many summers working as a silhouette artist from a booth on Llandudno pier and his ashes are interred at St. Tudno's. We thank

Oakley's great nephew, and Friend of St. Tudno's, Jerry Rendell for permission to reproduce the silhouettes. The display was accompanied by a self-guided tour of the WWI graves and memorials in the churchyard (see Churchyards article). Many thanks to the St. Tudno's openers team for opening the church every day during November to enable visitors to see the display.

For the rest of the winter St. Tudno's will be open weekends, Wednesdays and bank holidays. Carols by Candlelight will be on Sunday 23 December at 3.00 pm with Holy Trinity Choir, at 4.30 pm with Holy Trinity Handbell Ringers and at 6.00 pm with more congregational carols. There is no heating at St. Tudno's and with everybody holding candles it will not be safe to hand out the blankets, so please wrap up warmly! The paths will be lit, weather permitting, but a torch may still be useful if attending one of the later services.

We look forward to seeing you at St. Tudno's and the St. Tudno's team wish everyone a very happy Christmas and new year.

We are always pleased to welcome new Friends, please get in touch with me if you are interested in joining us in the care of St. Tudno's.



### Robert's Corner

#### A Little More About Slavery

Of course, the Christian church has not got a very good track record on this issue. The institution of slavery, by which (for example) hundreds of thousands of black people were transported to the plantations of America in the most appalling conditions (in which most of them died) was not condemned by the mainstream churches until the end of the 19th century. And even then, the New Testament hardly mounts a big-time challenge to the evils of the practice, hence (from the letter to the Ephesians): "Slaves, obey your earthly masters with fear and trembling."

In our current global situation, there are huge numbers of Christians suffering as victims of this inequity. In Pakistan for instance, many Christians there are enslaved for their faith – exploited in the brick kiln industry. And I expect some of you saw one or more of the excellent if horrifying documentaries on BBC 4 highlighting modern slavery in other parts of the world.

Meanwhile, it is unlikely that this town is totally free from slavery. Yes! Llandudno really! Let us all be vigilant. As I mentioned a couple of months ago, nail bars and car washes in the UK have often been sites of this inhuman abuse.

More to mention, I fear, in the New Year.

A Llandudno bookshop has recently changed its café's cake supplier. (Obviously, it would be advertising if I identified the shop, and of course you cannot guess – opposite M&S.) Now it continues to sell many delicious cakes, I am sure, but no longer can you enjoy a slice of rhubarb-and-cherry sponge, reckoned by connoisseurs to be the most wonderful cake in the whole world.

## Pakistan's Supreme Court overturns Assia Bibi's conviction

Pakistani Christian mother-of-five, Aasia Bibi, who has been on death row since November 2010 after being convicted under the country's notorious "blasphemy law", has been saved from hanging by a three-judge bench of the Supreme Court. The decision to acquit and release her was announced on Wednesday 31 October in a 56-page verdict.

Aasia reportedly told her lawyer, "I can't believe what I am hearing, will I go out now? Will they let me out, really? I just don't know what to say, I am very happy, I can't believe it."

#### #Christingle50 campaign

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Children's Society bringing Christingle to this country with a service held in Lincoln Cathedral in 1968.



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To celebrate this landmark anniversary, the Children's Society is running its #Christingle50 campaign, which aims to support vulnerable young people through raising funds at Christingle events and a collaboration with The Royal Academy of Music.

Some 200,000 10 to 17-year-olds in the UK are experiencing emotional neglect on a regular basis, and many are also struggling with other difficulties at home. The charity found that:

11% of 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect also do not have their own bed; 21% 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect had also been homeless in the last five years; and 20% of 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect also lived in a household that had used a food bank in the last five years.

Matthew Reed, Chief Executive of The Children's Society explains: 'Too many young people will wake up on Christmas morning like any other - feeling alone and unable to cope.'

The Children's Society has created an original song for schoolchildren, congregations or community choirs to include in their Christingle services. The song, 'Light a Candle', is available to download and listen to or learn for free from The Children's Society website.

## First non-British head for Mothers' Union

A South American woman has made history as the MU's first non-British Worldwide President. Sheran Harper from Guyana is the new Worldwide President of the 142-year-old movement's four million members in 84 countries. She takes over in January 2019 from Lynne Tembey.

Born in the United Kingdom, Harper grew up in Guyana. After her Clinical Practice at Guy's Hospital in London, she worked with the Ministry of Health in Guyana where she opened and managed new physiotherapy departments in hospitals throughout the country.

She stopped working in this area 17 years ago to focus on Mothers' Union. She has served as a volunteer at all levels from parish, diocese and province, and until recently, she was the worldwide parenting trainer where she rolled out Mothers' Union parenting programmes in 23 countries across the globe.

## Church children's groups are 'failing through lack of prayer'

Why do many Sunday schools and church groups for children falter, or even close down? Scripture Union thinks it knows the answer.

After conducting a recent poll of more than 1,500 ministries, Scripture Union says that people would be "amazed" by



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how many leaders and volunteers set aside "no or minimal" time for prayer. Hence, their ministries simply do not survive.

In a recent interview, SU's national director Tim Hastie-Smith told Premier Christian radio that prayer was "absolutely vital" and needed to be "at the centre" of church ministries in order for them to thrive. The organisation identified prayer and taking time to understand and respond to local needs as "two of the most important factors" in determining success.

### The Churchyards in November

At St. Tudno's our nest of buff tailed bumblebees was still active in mid November and bees were seen feeding on ivy flowers along the Pink Farm path. Where there are nearby gardens which provide flowers throughout winter, nests of this species can sometimes survive through winter but it might be a bit too far for these bees to fly to Happy Valley or Haulfre Gardens. Usually, new bumblebee queens go into hibernation over winter and the old queens, workers and males die off, particularly when the supply of flowers

dwindles and the weather becomes colder. The new queens will then make new nests in spring and we hope to find more nests in the churchyard next year. During November the First World War graves and memorials were marked with red ribbons as part of St. Tudno's WWI commemoration, with leaflets providing a self-guided tour of the churchyard.

At St. George's the deciduous trees had lost most of their leaves, which formed carpets of bronze and gold on the ground and interesting patterns on

some of the gravestones, where the leaves were outlined with moisture. Fruits on the strawberry tree were beginning to ripen and there were berries on other trees.

The church ground were in full use during the Llandudno Christmas Fayre, with stalls selling food and gifts, the Scripture Union Nativity photo booth — and even steam train rides! CAIS / Cyfle Cymru continue to cut the grass and were busy preparing the grounds for the Fayre to set up.
